East Creek Trail Maintenance July 13th By Jon Sherer

We will meet at 9:00 AM at the East Creek trailhead on Saturday, July 13th. This project can accommodate (and needs) lots of people and doesn't require horses, so come one and all!

We will be building check dams on the first 50 yards of the trail that is highly eroded. If you have a shovel or pick axe, bring it along. Of course, wear gloves and sunscreen, boots, long pants and long sleeves. Pack a lunch and bring plenty of water.

Directions to the trailhead: Take CR 501 to Vallecito. At the base of the dam, turn right onto CR 501A and drive along the back side of the lake. You will pass 3 Forest Service campgrounds. Just about 50 yards past the third one (North Canyon Campground) is a road to the right (Forest Service Road 852). Take it about a quarter mile to the trailhead.

We really need your help to restore this beautiful trail.

Membership Dues Increase

The Board of Directors is recommending increasing 4CBCH dues to \$40 for single and \$50 for family memberships in response to increases passed by the Back Country Horsemen of America and Back Country Horsemen of Colorado. Members will vote to approve this increase at the membership meeting on September 19, 2024.

At the Back Country Horsemen of Colorado Board meeting on June 15, the Board unanimously voted to:

- Accept and pass on to the chapters a BCHA dues increase of \$5 for all membership types. This increase was passed at the National Board Meeting in April.
- Increase the dues paid to BCHCO by the chapters by \$2 for Single and \$3 for Family.
- These increases will take effect January 1, 2025.

The board believes the increase of member dues is necessary because the current rate of \$30 single and \$40 family will not support the 4CBCH operational expenses. The increase will require 4CBCH to pay \$27 for single and \$33 for family for BCHA and BCHCO dues. 4CBCH is proud that we have not increased our membership dues since 2008, however, we now find that we have no choice.

The Board of Directors has also developed a new protocol to facilitate on-line membership applications which requires a change to the 4CBCH Bylaws. With this change, membership applications paid after October 1st will no longer be applied to the following year. Instead, memberships will expire one year after dues have been paid.

The board recommends that Article III, Section 3 of the Bylaws be amended to delete "Membership paid after October 1st will be credited to the following year" and be replaced by "Memberships expire one year after the payment of dues." The members will be asked to vote on this change at the September 19th membership meeting as well.

TYING-UP by Dr. Kellon, VMD posted on June 23, 2024

Tying up is not a specific disorder with one specific cause. It is a collection of symptoms that may have several different causes. A hallmark of all types of tying up is that the symptoms are caused by exercise and become evident during exercise. The typical progression is that the horse begins to feel "rough", with altered gaits, shortening of stride (especially behind), and increased sweating. The horse will slow down and eventually stop. The horse is obviously in pain with high pulse, respiratory rates and sweating. Muscles feel very hard to the touch, especially in the hindquarters and pectorals. Once stopped, the horse is very reluctant to move. There is little or no interest in eating or drinking. When the horse urinates (which may be a while), urine may have a reddish brown discoloration. Laboratory analysis confirms typing-up by elevated muscle enzymes.

Overexertion is an underestimated cause of sporadic tying up. Poorly conditioned horses that are overworked are most prone to this, as are horses in a conditioning program that fool their conditioners into thinking they are fitter than they are. During the process of the conditioning program, muscles increase their stores of carbohydrate (in the form of glycogen), increase the density of capillaries supplying the muscle with blood, increase activity of enzyme systems involved in utilizing fat and carbohydrate as energy, and increase the number of mitochondria in the cells.

Closely tied to both good hydration and normal muscle function is mineral status. Electrolytes are minerals present in the blood in their free and charged/ionized form. The most important for muscle function are sodium, chloride, potassium, calcium and magnesium. Sodium, chloride and potassium are responsible for holding water in the tissues and cells, and calcium is needed for the release of acetylcholine from nerve ends which triggers muscle contraction. Magnesium regulates calcium release and is needed to store ATP which powers both contraction and reuptake of calcium. Of all these minerals, sodium is the one that is always deficient in the natural diet in the form of salt.




