From the President's Pen


Hello everyone!

When tracking your Volunteer Hours, please remember:

What Counts:

-Trail clearing and Trailhead clean up, road clean up.

- Trail work on public land or open private lands.
 - Onsite support or food prep for work parties.
- Campground host if agency requested/required.
- Planning and Prep work for future work parties.
- Report hours ridden for advance planning a trail project to determine the level of effort required as Recon Hours.

What Doesn't Count:

- Cleaning up after yourself on the trail or at the trailhead.
- Trail work on your own property or other private property not open to the public.

WHY WHAT WE DO MATTERS:

The recent layoffs within the National Forest Service (NFS) are likely to result in significantly reduced trail maintenance, meaning trails will be less frequently repaired and could deteriorate in quality due to a lack of dedicated staff to manage them, potentially impacting the safety and experience of hikers and outdoor enthusiasts using public lands. Key points about the impact of NFS layoffs on trail maintenance:

- **Reduced workforce:** With fewer employees, there are fewer people available to perform routine trail maintenance tasks like clearing debris, fixing damaged sections, and addressing erosion issues.
- **Delayed projects:** Important trail improvement projects may be postponed or canceled altogether due to limited staff availability.
- **Increased safety concerns:** Deteriorating trails with less maintenance could lead to increased risks for hikers, including tripping hazards and potential injuries.
- **Impact on backcountry access:** Remote trails may see even greater neglect as access for maintenance crews becomes more difficult with fewer staff.
